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

#### **ACDA** IN THE BEGINNING

On February 4, 1959, thirty-five choral directors met in Kansas City, MO, for the purpose of establishing a national organization of choral music directors. The meeting, held in conjunction with the National Conference of the Music Teachers National Association, produced ACDA's first constitution and bylaws as well as the structural framework that would allow the monumental growth of our organization. While it was originally designated the American Choirmasters Association, Elwood Keister proposed that the organization be named the American Choral Directors Association.

The eighty-one officially designated charter members launched what was to become a significant and internationally recognized choral organization.

The following year, President Archie Jones guided the activities that focused on preparation for the first national conference, which was held on March 16-17, 1960 in Atlantic City, NJ. This meeting was held in conjunction with the National Conference of the Music Educators National Conference. The late Harry R. Wilson and R. Wayne Hugoboom were responsible for the conference program, which proved to be very informative and successful. This early success and that of subsequent conferences proved to be major factors in the early growth of ACDA.

The initial activities of ACDA included the structuring of geographic divisions paralleling MENC's regional designations. The first Western Region ACDA meeting was a one-day conference at Rio Hondo College in Whittier, CA in October 1968. Gene Simmonds was president and Howard Swan, Jester Hairston, Charles Hirt, and Maurice Allard were guest speakers. Since that time, the Western Region has contributed to the growth and influence of ACDA in the choral art.

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

#### Conference Honoree: Polly Vasché



Polly Vasché taught vocal music, handbells, piano and guitar at Thomas Downey High School in Modesto (CA) from 1975 to 2004. During that time the Knightengales and other Downey ensembles appeared in numerous concert and interest sessions at conferences of the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) and the California Music Educators Association (CMEA). The Downey Choirs hosted a Men's and Women's Ensemble Festival for many years, and traveled throughout the state on annual tours visiting outstanding high school choral programs. For ten years Polly also conducted the Chancel Choir at Centenary Methodist Church in Modesto.

A 1960 graduate of Coronado (CA) High School, Polly earned two degrees at Stanford (B.A. History, M.A. Education), and worked in Tokyo, San Diego, and Walla Walla (WA) before entering CSU Stanislaus to study music at the age of 30. Majoring in both Piano and Vocal Performance, she received a B.A. in Music and a teaching credential in 1975. On sabbatical leave from Downey in 1989-90, Polly studied one semester each at Westminster Choir College in Princeton (NJ) with Joseph Flummerfelt, and at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles with Paul Salamunovich. For three summers she sang in the Festival of Masses with Robert Shaw in San Francisco, and for ten years in the California Choral Company with William Dehning, including two European tours.

In addition to her formal education, professional conferences and colleagues have been the prime sources of inspiration and knowledge for Polly throughout her career. She began as Northern California Newsletter Editor in the 1980s, serving on the board that envisioned and established the ECCO conference. As Northern

California ACDA President she assisted in the transition to state unification with the Southern California Chapter in the early 1990s. Various state and division board positions followed.

After retiring, Polly was appointed to five consecutive Western Region Boards as Honor Choirs Coordinator for conferences in Anaheim, Tucson, Reno, Santa Barbara, and Pasadena. She serves as choral clinician in the Bay Area, Sacramento, and the Central Valley, and recently helped found the Modesto Symphony Orchestra Youth

Chorus. She conducts the handbell choir at her church, and is the Central Region Representative for the California Choral Conductors Association (CCDA).

Honors include the CA ACDA Howard Swan Award, CMEA Choral Educator of the Year, CSU Stanislaus Alumna of the Year, and Modesto Rotary Teacher of the Year. Polly lives in Modesto with her husband Burt (Downey HS English, retired), without whom she could not have accomplished most of the above. They are busy with music activities, travel, and giving parties for fellow singers, teachers, and friends — with no agenda!!



FEATURED ENSEMBLE: CALMUS

A perfect blend of sound, precision, lightness and wit. These are the hallmarks of **Calmus**, now one of the most successful vocal groups in Germany. The ensemble has forged a refined sound which few groups achieve. The wide range of sound colors, the joy in performing that musicians convey on the concert platform, and their varied and imaginative programs are praised by the press time and time again. These five Leipzig musicians have won a whole string of international prizes and competitions, including the ECHO Klassik and Supersonic Award, and the reach of their activities is constantly expanding, taking them throughout Europe as well as to North and South America. In 2010 the quintet made its debut at Carnegie Hall, New York.

The musicians are tireless in their quest to discover new repertoire. Shaped by the centuries-old tradition of great German boys' choirs, they are naturally at home in the vocal music of the Renaissance, the Baroque and the Romantic. The music of our own time is also a real passion. In all their ventures, there are frequently interesting partnerships with musicians such as the Lautten Compagney Berlin, the Rascher Saxophone Quartet, Hamburger Ratsmusik and the Frankfurt Radio Bigband. As this often means totally new repertoire in the area of contemporary music, over the years Calmus has commissioned numerous new works from composers including Bernd Franke, Steffen Schleiermacher, Wolfram Buchenberg, Mathew Rosenblum, Bill Dobbins, Michael Denhoff and Harald Banter, and the group has given many world premieres. It goes without saying that they revel in singing pop, folk and jazz, as well as chansons and golden oldies from the 1920s.



Part of their work is devoted to encouraging the up-and-coming generation, so teaching and workshops are part of their regular schedule, both at home in Leipzig and on their travels. It's no wonder that Calmus, with its unique line-up of soprano, countertenor, tenor, baritone and bass, is gaining more and more fans worldwide.



FEATURED ENSEMBLE: LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE 8PM

Saturday, March 17

Walt Disney Concert Hall

The Los Angeles Master Chorale is widely recognized as the country's leading professional choir and one of Southern California's most vibrant cultural treasures. Hailed for its powerful performances, technical precision, and artistic daring, the Master Chorale is led by Kiki and David Gindler Artistic Director Grant Gershon and President and CEO Jean Davidson. Founded by legendary conductor Roger Wagner in 1964, it is a founding resident company of The Music Center and choir-in-residence at Walt Disney Concert Hall. Chorister positions are highly sought after and the fully professional choir is a diverse and vocally dynamic group showcasing the many voices of L.A.

Presenting its own concert series each season, the Los Angeles Master Chorale performs choral music from the earliest writings to contemporary compositions striking a balance between innovation and tradition. To date, the Master Chorale has commissioned 51 and premiered 99 new works, of which 67 were world premieres. It has had two composers-in-residence, Morten Lauridsen (1994-2001) and Shawn Kirchner (2012-2015), with composer/conductor Eric Whitacre its current Swan Family artist-in-residence. It has been awarded three ASCAP/Chorus America Awards for Adventurous Programming as well as Chorus America's prestigious Margaret Hillis Award for Choral Excellence. In 2017 it was inducted into the American Classical Music Hall of Fame.

During its 54th season, nine concert programs will be presented in Walt Disney Concert Hall. The season is bookended by performances of towering choral pillars: Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* opens the season in September — paired with Leonard Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms* to honor the composer's centenary — and the Brahms *Requiem* will close the season in June 2018 with works by Pulitzer Prize-winning composers David Lang and Caroline Shaw also featured.

The Master Chorale's Hidden Handel Project, an exploration of Handel's great but under-presented oratorios, continues with *Israel In Egypt* in February. This performance will feature innovative projections by Syrian/Armenian visual artist Kevork Mourad who will create imagery in real time from the stage. In May 2018 the Master Chorale will present the world premiere of *dreams of the new world* commissioned from composer Ellen Reid. Inspired by westward expansions and the forging of new frontiers, the work draws upon interviews conducted in Memphis, Houston, and Los Angeles to build a compelling and personal libretto by Sarah LaBrie. This exciting new work is paired with Terry Riley's iconic *In C* and both works will feature the acclaimed wild Up ensemble.

Guest conductors will helm three holiday celebrations: Renowned Venezuelan conductor María Guinand will lead the Master Chorale's first-ever Día de los Muertos concert exploring a range of Latin American traditions centered around rituals of death and celebration with works by Mexican, Argentinian, and Cuban composers in October. In December, the Master Chorale's Artist-in-Residence Eric Whitacre will lead two Festival of Carols holiday performances and Associate Conductor Jenny Wong will make her solo Disney Hall conducting debut with a rare performance of all six of Bach's motets. December concerts also include Handel's Messiah and the 37th annual Messiah Sing-Along.

The Los Angeles Master Chorale has performed in more than 500 concerts with the Los Angeles Philharmonic at both Disney Hall and the Hollywood Bowl, and has toured with the orchestra to Europe and New York City. Performances in the orchestra's 2017/18 season include the season opening concerts featuring Mozart's Laut verkünde unsre Freude, K. 623 and Ave verum corpus, K. 618 conducted by Music Director Gustavo Dudamel; Mendelssohn's A Midsummer's Night's Dream with Principal Guest Conductor Susanna Mälkki; Bernstein's Mass with Dudamel; the U.S. premiere of Andrew Norman's A Trip to the Moon conducted by Teddy Abrams and directed by Yuval Sharon; Beethoven's 9th and Bernstein's Chichester Psalms with Dudamel; and Schumann's Das Paradies und die Peri conducted by Dudamel and directed by Peter Sellars.

Praised for its definitive performances, the Los Angeles Master Chorale is also committed to recording the choral repertoire. Its esteemed discography includes seven recordings under Gershon, the most recent being the national anthems/ the little match girl passion by David Lang on Cantaloupe Records. Albums released under former Music Director Paul Salamunovich on RCM include the Grammy-nominated Lauridsen: Lux Aeterna, a recording that helped to secure the work's place as a modern masterpiece. The Master Chorale is also featured with Gershon on the soundtracks of many major motion pictures and is heard beyond the concert hall via broadcasts by Southern California's Classical KUSC.

Committed to community engagement and fostering music education in schools, the Los Angeles Master Chorale's education programs include Voices Within residencies that encourage students to write and perform their own songs, and an expansive Oratorio Project for high school students. The Master Chorale also presents an annual High School Choir Festival, which brings teenagers from around the Southland to perform in Walt Disney Concert Hall.





FEATURED ENSEMBLE: SANTA FE DESERT CHORALE

First United Methodist Church

Founded in 1982 by Lawrence "Larry" Bandfield, the Santa Fe Desert Chorale is one of the longest continually performing professional music organizations in New Mexico, as well as one of the most distinguished. In his review of the "American Voices" program, Scott Cantrell of The Dallas Morning News wrote "The variety certainly displayed the ensemble's impressive versatility. Habermann consistently got vivid performances, introspective music elegantly colored and shaped, extrovert fare delivered with great pizzazz. Individual singers got lots of solo exposure."

Now in his ninth season, Artistic Director Joshua Habermann leads the Chorale in repertoire spanning seven centuries, from early polyphony to contemporary works. The composition of the Chorale is truly national in scope and the ensemble is recognized among the finest American chamber choirs. A recent highlight was an invitational appearance at the 2015 ACDA National Conference in Utah, which was later broadcast by Minnesota Public Radio. In 2017-2018 the Chorale can be heard in Chicago, Dallas, Fort Worth, Los Angeles, and Oklahoma City as well as in regular winter and summer seasons in New Mexico. Now in its 35th year, the Desert Chorale summer festival season is a centerpiece of the cultural life of Santa Fe, and among the nation's most significant choral events.

Throughout its history, the Chorale has maintained a commitment to give voice to music from Hispanic and Native American communities. Dedicated to advancing the composers of our time, the Chorale has commissioned twenty-two works

by eighteen composers; three quarters of the composers commissioned have been American. In addition, another seven works have been given their world or American premieres by the Santa Fe Desert Chorale. The ensemble performs at historical sites in Santa Fe such as the Cathedral Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi and Loretto Chapel, as well as other venues throughout the Southwest.

The Desert Chorale prides itself on its strong relationships within the community of Northern New Mexico, and enjoys collaborations with the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, Museum of Indian Arts and Culture, New Mexico History Museum, NDI-NM, Performance Santa Fe, Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, Santa Fe Symphony and Chorus, Santa Fe Pro Musica, and The Santa Fe Opera, among others. Community engagement and fostering the next generation of singers and arts administrators are integral parts of the Desert Chorale's mission.



FEATURED ENSEMBLE: TRUE NORTH

True North is a contemporary ensemble that blends high-powered vocal and instrumental jazz with elements of pop, rock and soul to present an entertaining program of contemporary jazz compositions and familiar songs.

Together, the four singers — Katie Campbell, Sharmila G. Lash, Fletcher Sheridan, and Matt Falker — have experience in songwriting, arranging, touring, session singing, choral singing, and teaching. Basically, True North runs the musical gamut! They have been featured artists at the Jazz Education Network conference, and at jazz festivals like the Northwest College Jazz Festival in Wyoming and the Cuesta College Jazz Festival in California. They have also performed at numerous jazz clubs, like Los Angeles' esteemed jazz club, bluewhale.

The group is the result of diverse and innovative musical minds coming together with a fantastic band to create a powerful musical experience. True North has appeared on four albums, including their own 2016 release, Voyage.

#### ADVANCING THE ART SESSIONS

Each session is a combination of reading sessions, interest sessions, round tables, Workouts for your Choir and S.M.A.R.T. Talks (Seminars on Music, The Arts, and Related Topics) that are scheduled simultaneously.

#### CHAT WITH A COMPOSER

Chat with a Composer is back this year. This event, held near the entrance to the Exhibit Hall during Exhibit Hours, offers conference delegates the opportunity to strike up a conversation with one or more composers. We found that gathering a small group of composers, rather than one-on-one "buttonhole" appointments, had a synergistic effect for multiple conductors and composers to connect meaningfully. #### CHOIR WORKOUT SESSIONS

Choir Workouts are designed for all directors who teach elementary, middle school, or high school levels to learn practical new tools and techniques that can be taken home and used in their own choral classrooms. Three Pasadena area school choirs will rehearse in three different rooms with three noted choral clinicians on Thursday and Friday afternoons with a performance at a Saturday morning concert session. These choirs will bring one or two prepared songs for each clinician to rehearse. An additional song will be introduced at Thursday's session that will be prepared for the Saturday performance. Attendees will have the opportunity to see master teachers rehearse, motivate, and improve the performance standards for these three choirs. All conference attendees have the opportunity to see the "final product" Saturday morning that will be the result of the conductor/choir/clinician collaboration.

THE ACTIVE CHOIR: USING WEST AFRICAN DRUMMING AND DANCE TO AUGMENT CHORAL REHEARSALS AND PERFORMANCE.

This session will show the positive impact of incorporating African Drumming and Dance into choral practice and performance. Specifically, West African Dance is a full-body, high-energy experience requiring both coordination and communication, and control of the body and the mind—skills that are essential for exceptional choral singing. During this session we will examine how singers' bodies transform during dance, and how our thinking and attention are developed through movement. A demonstration choir will explore the positive outcomes of incorporating non-western dance into choral rehearsals by learning movements and simple West African rhythms and dances that attendees will be able to incorporate immediately into their own choirs.

# DEVELOPING EXPRESSIVE SINGING AND INDEPENDENT MUSICIANSHIP IN YOUNG SINGERS THROUGH VOCAL PREPARATION.

This session will present strategies for developing expressive singing and independent musicianship skills of young singers throughout the rehearsal, especially focusing on the vocal preparation period. This intercession will present the vision and talent of Colburn School teaching artist, Leeav Sofer, along with the experience and hope of his co-founder Christopher Mack, a Community Outreach worker. Music Therapy Consultant, Kate Richards Geller, will offer a clinical perspective and context for further research about the power of group singing to create meaningful change in society. #### EXPLORING GERMAN MASTERPIECES WITH CALMUS.

Travis Rogers, presiding

All schooled at Leipzig's St. Thomas Church Choir School ("Thomanerchor," which has an 800 year vocal tradition in Leipzig, and where Bach worked for 27 years), the five singers of Calmus have intimate knowledge of historically correct performance practice (and, obviously, authentic German pronunciation), and with their extensive experience, they can talk about different possible approaches for interpretation. For this workshop Calmus has selected three motets by the most important composers of German sacred music: Bach, Mendelssohn and Schütz. Singing both alone and with all the participants, Calmus will demonstrate and rehearse all the various aspects of voicing, phrasing, sound, blend, and they will give you an idea of how this music was originally performed in Leipzig's St. Thomas Church.



#### BILINGUAL CONDUCTING: CONNECTING VOICES AND INSTRUMENTS THROUGH CULTURE-SPECIFIC VOCABULARY.



#### Performing Ensembles and Director Bios



#### AMERICAN RIVER COLLEGE VOCAL JAZZ ENSEMBLE

This year marks the twenty-first year in which the American River College Vocal Jazz Ensemble has been in existence under the direction of Arthur Lapierre. The ensemble has been honored sixteen times by DownBeat Magazine since 2005. The ensemble has regularly participated in festivals and conferences, including ACDA, IAJE, JEN, and CASMEC. The American River College Vocal Jazz Ensemble is the advanced-level vocal group in a two-year jazz degree comprising courses including jazz choir, jazz/pop styles, jazz history, jazz theory, jazz improvisation, jazz piano, and applied lessons.



Arthur Lapierre is currently professor of music and director of the Vocal Jazz Ensembles at American River College, where he also teaches studio voice, jazz history, and voice class. Lapierre's ensembles have performed for ISME, IAJE, JEN, ACDA, California MEA, New York State Music Teachers Association, and at various additional conferences and festivals. He has served ACDA as the Northeast Region R&R Chair for Jazz and Show Choirs.





#### California State University Fullerton University Singers

California State University, Fullerton's University Singers perform all over the world and regularly collaborate with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, the Pacific Symphony, the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra, and the Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra. The ensemble was in residence in Paris in June 2015 and performed a concert of Tarik O'Regan's music in Carnegie Hall in November 2015. The University Singers can be heard on Sony Records' John Williams and Steven Spielberg: The Ultimate Collection and Yarlung Records' Nostos: The Homecoming of Music.



Robert Istad is professor of music and director of choral studies at California State University, Fullerton, and artistic director of Pacific Chorale. Choirs under his leadership have performed throughout the world and can be heard on Sony Classical Records and Yarlung Records. Istad received his bachelor's at Augustana College in Illinois, master's at CSU Fullerton, and doctorate at the University of Southern California. Istad is president of California Choral Directors Association and is Dean of Chorus for America's National Academy for Conductors.



#### CANTORUM CHAMBER CHOIR

Since its 2011 inception, Cantorum Chamber Choir has emerged as one of the premier non-collegiate chamber groups in the Western United States. Comprising thirty-five select singers from diverse musical backgrounds, over one third of Cantorum members are professional music educators, soloists, and choristers. Cantorum has performed in the distinguished NOVA Chamber Series, collaborated with the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble, and performed onstage in Ballet West's Carmina Burana. Based in Orem, Utah, Cantorum collaborates regularly with local school choirs as part of its community outreach programs.



Steve Durtschi is conductor and artistic director of Cantorum and director of choirs at Timpanogos High School in Orem, Utah, where he conducts five choirs and teaches AP music theory. He is a former member of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the Salt Lake Vocal Artists. Durtschi earned his bachelor's from Utah State University and his master's from Brigham Young University. He also studied organ at Utah State and has been active as an organist and member of AGO.





#### CLOVIS NORTH HIGH SCHOOL WOMEN'S CHORALE

The Clovis North Women's Chorale is made up of ninth- through twelfth-grade young women who have auditioned to be part of a unique experience once a week. They all come from different ensembles, but their abilities and commitment are unified. The Women's Chorale has been performing together since the school opened ten years ago. They have sung at the Command Performance Concert at CSU Fresno, CSU Fullerton Festival, USC Festival, Heritage Festival of Gold, and other Heritage Festivals.



Heather Bishop is currently the choir director and has been the department chair of the performing arts at Clovis North High School since it opened in 2007. She has also been the CUSD Elementary Music Resource Specialist for VAPA and a mentor teacher for the district. She received her bachelor's from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music in piano performance. Bishop is also on the voice faculty at Idyllwild Summer Arts Academy.



#### CRYSTAL CHILDREN'S CHOIR

Crystal Children's Choir was founded in Northern California in 1994 and has gained international acclaimed for its distinction. More than 1,200 choristers from California and 650 from Taiwan and China participate in this reputable choral program. The choir has performed at numerous prestigious venues internationally and received invitations to perform at Kodaly, CMEA, MENC and ACDA conferences. Through offering a unique musical and life-enhancing education, Crystal hopes to nurture our younger generation using teamwork, love of music, and excellence in choral singing.



Karl Chang has been the co-founder and president of Crystal Children's Choir since 1994. Chang has presented at several ACDA National and Regional conferences and was twice a guest conductor at Carnegie Hall. He is also active in the choral field across Asia. Chang founded the Ching Ching Chorus, a renowned 180-voice community choir in 1981 and continues to conduct and inspire singers in their love for singing. Holding a doctorate in Education Leadership, he also earned MBA and M.S. degrees in Engineering. However, his passion for choral art has led him to pursue his lifelong dream in children's music education.



Jenny Chiang began her music education in Taiwan with Chuan-Sheng Lu, often referred to as the "Father of Children's Choral Music." Chiang co-founded Crystal Children's Choir in 1994 and has served as Artistic Director ever since. She has studied choral conducting with Charlene Archibeque at San Jose State University. Chiang performed with the choir at several ACDA National and Regional conferences, CMEA conventions, MENC conventions, and OAKE conferences. Chiang was also invited to present at numerous CMEA and ACDA choral workshops.





#### DOWNEY HIGH SCHOOL EPIC JAZZ CHOIR

Downey Jazz Choir has sixteen voices that blend handsomely. They rehearse five to eight hours per week, learning songs from a variety of jazz styles. They perform at various events in the community and the following jazz festivals: Folsom, Reno, Fullerton, and Monterey. They have sung four times at Carnegie Hall, at the Lincoln Center's Allen Room, and in 2016 at the Apollo Theater. They won the sweepstakes at the Folsom Jazz Festival (2008) and the gold medal at the Inaugural Disney World Celebration Jazz Festival (2009). They are finalists of the Monterey Next Generation Jazz Festival since 2005.



Cory Olariu was born in Romania and studied piano and trumpet at the "Ion Vidu" school of music in Timisoara, his hometown. He came to the United States in 1989 and graduated with a master's from Cal State University Long Beach. In 2001 he began at Downey High School teaching all bands and choirs. His groups are consistently finalists at the Monterey Next Generation Jazz Festival. He received the Fidelity Investments "Inspire The Future Award," was honored by Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe in 2006, and was nominated for the Bravo Award.



#### FOOTHILL HIGH SCHOOL MADRIGAL SINGERS

The Foothill High School Madrigals Singers is an auditioned ensemble composed of ninth- through twelfth- grade students. Performing only the highest level of choral repertoire from a diverse multitude of time periods and cultures, the Madrigal Singers aim to foster an appreciation for the choral art within their community. They regularly perform for local businesses, schools, and churches throughout Tustin and go on an annual performance tour. During the holidays, the Madrigal Singers don themselves in traditional Dickens garb and perform over twenty caroling engagements in order to fundraise for the choral music program.



Chelsea Dehn holds a bachelor's with an emphasis in vocal performance from the University of California, Irvine, and a master's in choral conducting from California State University, Los Angeles. Dehn has taught choral music in the Tustin Unified School District since 2005 and is the director of the choral music program at Foothill High School. Dehn has conducted in world-famous venues, and her choirs were performers at the 2014 ACDA Conference. Dehn is the director of music at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Orange.





#### ISERRA CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOLCHAMBER SINGERS

The Chamber Singers of JSerra Catholic High School are one of two performing groups in the school of nearly 1,200 students. Consisting of students from every grade, this auditioned group performs a variety of musical styles from a wide range of cultures, time periods, languages, and genres. The Chamber Singers were honored to be the first Catholic high school choir in the country (under the auspices of Worldstrides) to perform a solo concert in Carnegie Hall and have been confirmed to participate in Musica Del Mundo Festival in Umbria during their upcoming performance tour to Italy.



Brian Dehn is in his seventh year at JSerra Catholic High School. The program at JSerra has two performing choirs—Chamber Singers and Advanced Women's Ensemble. During his tenure at JSerra, Dehn has been responsible for creating the Arts Magnet Program, adding guitar, piano, and handbells to the curriculum, and creating a supportive culture for the arts. He is currently director of music ministry at St. Boniface Church and founder of Meistersingers, a thirty-twovoice professional chamber choir specializing in choral demanding repertoire that commissioned over 200 works.



#### JOAQUIN MILLER MIDDLE SCHOOL ADVANCED CHOIR

Established in 2002 under the direction of Anthony E. Arnold, the Miller Choral Music Department is a group of young men and women dedicated to the principle of excellence striving to do the right thing all the time. Since 2005, the Advanced Choir has not scored any less than a superior rating at any choral festival they have attended in the continental United States. Recent highlights include 2017 CASMEC Performing Choir; 2015 ACDA National Conference; and a 2014 Spotlight Performance at Carnegie Hall for the Choirs of America Invitational Choral Festival.



Anthony E. Arnold has been teaching instrumental and choral music for twenty-three years, the last sixteen years at Joaquin Miller Middle School in San Jose, California. At Miller Middle School he teaches Choir-The Beginning, Advanced Choir, and Beginning Band. Arnold was recognized by California MEA in 2009 as Outstanding Choral Music Educator. He is currently working on completing his Summer Kodály Certificate at Holy Names University in Oakland, California, and is a graduate of Azusa Pacific University in music education.





#### JOHN F. KENNEDY MIDDLE SCHOOL DYNAMICS

The vision of Dynamics, "To Make Great Music in Great Places with Great Friends," is carried out with a strong commitment to inclusion. The 130-member group is proud to sing a wide range of literature at a consistently high level as a non-auditioned choir, regularly receiving top ratings at festivals while also valuing singing as a form of service. Dynamics 7/8 performed in Carnegie Hall with Choirs of America in 2014 and completed an East Coast performance tour with stops at the Westminster Choir College of Rider University and the Curtis Institute of Music for an exchange concert with Princeton Girlchoir in the summer of 2016.



Shelley Durbin is in her eleventh year as the director of the 240-member vocal music program at Kennedy Middle School in Cupertino, California. In addition to leading Kennedy's two award-winning choirs and vibrant musical theater program, she enjoys mentoring young teachers and collaborating with her research colleagues on metacognition in musical practices and on motivation in the large ensemble. Durbin was also a band director for many years and still enjoys opportunities to play her flute. Durbin is the 2017-2018 Teacher of the Year for Kennedy Middle School.



#### L.A. CHORAL LAB

The L.A. Choral Lab is a group of young professional musicians who live in Los Angeles and who wish to share their love of choral singing with the local and global community. The ensemble, an SATB chamber choir consisting of thirty young professional vocal arists, performs two major season concerts per year. The L.A. Choral Lab has commissioned a dozen new choral works and delivered the local premiere of several more. Through their activities they seek to further their mission of advocating for living composers and the music they write, and reaching out to the community in a way that creates new lovers of choral music.



Michael Alfera brings with him diverse musical experience as a pianist, composer, music director, accompanist, arranger, and music teacher. His interest in new classical music led him to found the L.A. Choral Lab in early 2014. Alfera has served as conductor of the Los Angeles-based Ebell Chorale and as the principal accompanist of the Gay Men's Chorus of Los Angeles. He is currently a student at Southwestern Law School, J.D. Class of 2018.





#### Los Angeles Urban Voices Project

The Urban Voices Choir is composed of artists and performers from the Skid Row neighborhood in Downtown Los Angeles. Throughout the year, they are sharing music and its healing power with many individuals and audiences inside and outside the neighborhood of Skid Row, the epicenter of Los Angeles's homelessness crisis. The choir is one of many programs presented by Urban Voices Project, a non-profit that brings the healing power of music directly to individuals disenfranchised by homelessness, mental health issues, and unemployment. The program combines community singing and music education to provide practical opportunities for individuals to transcend their current circumstances and participate in a creative program of positive change.



Leeav Sofer is the co-founder and artistic director of The Urban Voices Project, an outreach program that combines music education, therapeutic music workshops and community singing for individuals disenfranchised by homelessness in Los Angeles. These programs have garnered Sofer recognition on the front page of the Los Angeles Times, on NPR's All Things Considered, featured in The New Yorker and allowed him to share the stage with various celebrities and politicians. Sofer, recognized as Jewish Journal's esteemed "30 under 30", also leads the band Mostly Kosher, dedicated to preserving and progressing cultural folk music of Judaic heritage. Sofer currently is on faculty at the Colburn School in Los Angeles where he teaches and facilitates outreach and community engagement programs.



#### MONTE VISTA HIGH SCHOOL CONCERT CHOIR

Monte Vista's award-winning Concert Choir embodies the tradition of excellence in choral music. The group, comprising seventy to one hundred singers, is chosen from over 2,100 students on campus. Monte Vista Concert Choir singers participate in five concert series each school year, perform frequently in the community, and tour around the nation each spring. They travel and perform internationally, most recently in Spain, where they were honored to sing in glorious venues including the Santa Maria de Montserrat, La Sagrada Familia, and host a benefit concert for the Fundación Josep Carreras contra la leucemia at Santa Maria del Mar.



Jodi Reed is a conductor, pianist, and vocalist. Reed began her musical career at a young age studying piano competitively. She discovered choral music in high school and has since fostered her love for choral music through conducting university, school, church, and community choirs. In 2016 she conducted Monte Vista Chamber Singers on NPR's nationally syndicated radio show From The Top hosted by Christopher O'Riley, reaching over 1 million listeners each airing. Prior to teaching at Monte Vista High School, Reed maintained a competitive piano studio for over twenty-five years. She received a bachelor's from SJSU and a master's from CSUEB.





#### MOUNT SAN ANTONIO COLLEGE CHAMBER SINGERS

The Mt. SAC Chamber Singers have won numerous awards and have received special performance invitations throughout the world, including performances at ten ACDA national and regional conferences and headline performances in Canada, Australia, and throughout Europe. They received two platinum medals at the Xinghai Prize International Choir Championships in Guangzhou, China; were named champions at the Grand Prix Choir Competition in Varna, Bulgaria; received the first-place prize at the Grand Prix of Nations in Magdeburg, Germany; won the title of Choir of the World at the International Musical Eisteddfod Competition in Llangollen, Wales; and have also performed as headliners on the Carnegie Hall Stage on four different occasions.



Bruce Rogers has been the director of choral activities at Mt. San Antonio College since 1994. Choirs under his direction have achieved top ranking in national and international competitions throughout the world. He has been invited as a clinician, lecturer, and guest conductor in thirty states along with Europe, Canada, and Australia. Rogers has conducted choirs at twelve ACDA conferences and recently served on the jury panel for the "International Musical Eisteddfod Competition" in Llangollen, Wales.

#### MOUNT SANT ANTONIO COLLEGE FERMATA NOWHERE

In the Spring of 2009, a relatively unknown a cappella ensemble from Mt. San Antonio College walked into a theater in Midtown Manhattan and shocked the collegiate a cappella community by becoming the first community college to win the Finals of the International Championship of Collegiate A Cappella. Since their International Finals win, Fermata Nowhere has performed for audiences across the continent singing everything from eight part Renaissance motets to barbershop, to rock and hiphop. Former members of this ensemble have gone on to sing in professional a cappella ensembles, including Avi Kaplan of the Pentatonix, and three members of the award winning Filharmonic.



#### NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY UNACCOMPANIED

Northern Arizona Unaccompanied is an eight-member student-led a cappella group from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff. The group was founded in September 2015, becoming the fourth a cappella group at NAU. With only eight singers, Unaccompanied is uniquely small compared to most groups in the collegiate a cappella world. The group performs a wide variety of songs that span the decades, favoring the hits of the past over the hits of today. Unaccompanied is best known for their one-on-a-part arrangements and each member has a strong foundation in classical training, choral music, and vocal jazz. They have headlined for various music conferences and a cappella festivals in the southwest, actively performed throughout the state of Arizona, and competed annually in the International Championship of Collegiate A Cappella.





#### NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S CHORALE

The Northern Arizona University Women's Chorale is part of a vibrant program with over 230 participants in eight ensembles: Shrine of the Ages Choir, Chamber Singers, Men's Chorale, Women's Chorale, University Singers, High Altitude, Northern Voices, and the Harold M. Harter Memorial Handbell Choir. The energy generated by these talented musicians (more than half are non-music majors) makes NAU a fun and exciting place to sing. The NAU choral faculty and graduate conducting assistants have successful teaching experience in the public schools, which provides strong role models for undergraduate students planning to enter the music teaching profession. This performance will mark the Women's Chorale's first appearance at an ACDA regional conference.



Ryan W. Holder is currently in his twelfth year as the associate director of choral studies at Northern Arizona University, where he directs the Women's Chorale, Northern Voices, and High Altitude vocal jazz ensembles; teaches undergraduate and graduate courses; and serves as the adviser for the four contemporary a cappella groups and the NAU student chapter of ACDA. He is the coordinator of the annual Jazz/Madrigal Festival. Holder currently serves as the president of Arizona ACDA. He holds his doctorate from the University of Miami in addition to bachelor's and master's degrees from Southern Oregon University and University of Northern Colorado.



#### Pepperdine University Chamber Choir

The Pepperdine Chamber Choir is Pepperdine University's top-tier vocal ensemble. The Chamber Choir, now beginning its sixth year in existence, comprises both music majors and non-music majors. This ensemble tours regularly both domestically and abroad. Recent tour destinations include the western and southern United States, Italy, Switzerland, and the Czech Republic. The Chamber Choir will tour the Midwestern United States this spring. This is the Pepperdine Chamber Choir's first appearance at an ACDA conference.



**Ryan Board** is the director of choral activities at Pepperdine University, where he directs the Pepperdine Concert Choir and the Pepperdine Chamber Choir. He is principal conductor and artistic director for the Prague Choral Festival and serves as the director of music at St. Matthews United Methodist Church in Newbury Park, California. Choirs under Board's direction have been invited to perform for state, regional, national, and international events, including the national conference of ACDA. His degrees are from the University of Northern Colorado, Westminster College, and the Conservatory of Music and Dance at the University of Missouri-Kansas City.





#### SKYLINE COLLEGE SOUNDSCAPE

Soundscape is the award-winning vocal jazz ensemble at Skyline College in San Bruno, California. They perform a wide variety of contemporary choral repertoire including jazz, pop, R&B, and world music. Soundscape performs at campus concerts, community events, and statewide jazz festivals and competitions, including the Cuesta College, Columbia College, and Santa Cruz Jazz Festivals. Soundscape won second place and six soloist medals at the Reno Jazz Festival in 2016, and they performed at the NewYork City Jazz Festival (Apollo Theater) and Carnegie Hall in April 2017.



Michelle Hawkins is an award-winning choral director, arranger, vocalist, and flutist. As associate professor of music at Skyline College, she directs the vocal jazz ensemble Soundscape. Her groups have won four Downbeat Music Awards for Best Vocal Jazz Group. Hawkins serves on the faculty of the Stanford Jazz Workshop, where she received the 2017 Outstanding Music Educator Award. Hawkins arranges for and sings lead soprano in several professional groups, and has toured extensively throughout the United States and Japan. She holds degrees from the University of Southern California and UC Berkeley.



#### **USC THORNTON CONCERT CHOIR**

The USC Thornton Concert Choir is a fully auditioned mixed chorus of approximately fifty-eight voices consisting of both music majors and non-music majors. Under the direction of Cristian Grases, the group explores classical and global repertoire from the Renaissance through the twenty-first century. Concerts, both on and off campus, include annual fall and spring concerts, festival presentations, and collaborations with other on-campus choral and instrumental ensembles in the Winter Gala and other concerts, and invitations to perform at national and regional conferences.



Cristian Grases, a native of Venezuela, joined the University of Southern California faculty in the fall 2010 semester and is currently an associate professor of choral music and conductor of the USCThornton Concert Choir. He is a sought-out conductor, clinician, academic, adjudicator, and an award-winning composer whose works have been commissioned and sung by numerous prestigious ensembles. Grases is currently a member of the Executive Committee of the International Federation for Choral Music representing the region of Latin America and the Caribbean.





#### VOX FEMINA LOS ANGELES

VOX Femina Los Angeles gives women voice through the performance of quality choral literature. Diverse in culture, age, race, belief, and sexual identity, VOX is a chorus committed to commissioning new works and raising awareness about issues that affect women. Through music, VOX aims to create a world that affirms the worth and dignity of every person. Throughout its impressive twenty-one-year journey, VOX has built its prominence in the choral community by way of numerous appearances at ACDA and Chorus America conferences and over 200 appearances throughout the United States, Mexico, and Canada.



Iris S. Levine, founder and artistic director, is nationally recognized for her excellence in choral conducting. Levine earned a doctorate in choral music from the University of Southern California and a master's in choral conducting from Temple University. Levine is the Interim Dean of the College of Letters, Arts, and Social California State Polytechnic University in Pomona. Levine authored the chapter on "Working with the Women's Community Choir" in the 2012 GIA publication, Conducting Women's Choirs: Strategies for Success. Levine is the editor for the Iris S. Levine Treble Choral Series with Pavane Publishing.



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#### THE WESTMINSTER CHORUS

Under the direction of Justin Miller, The Westminster Chorus is the 2009 "Choir of the World" Pavarotti Trophy winner and the International Chorus Gold Medalist of the Barbershop Harmony Society for 2007, 2010, and 2015. Uniquely composed of young and committed singers, the chorus in its current organization formed in 2002. Motivated by the joy of joining with other young brothers in harmonious song, the chorus is truly grateful for the recent recognition it has earned and thrilled for the new performances and competitions to soon come.



Justin Miller is a Chapman University graduate, where he earned degrees in music education and conducting. Miller has been director of the Westminster Chorus since 2008. During his tenure with Westminster, it has grown into an ensemble with a diverse repertoire while keeping its Barbershop roots. In addition, Miller is the director of choral music at Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana, CA, and is director of the Masters of Harmony. He and his wife, Andrea, have a daughter, Tenley, and have a second child on the way.





#### Young Women's Chorus of San Francisco

The Young Women's Chorus of San Francisco is the premier ensemble of the Young Women's Choral Projects (YWCP). Founded in 2012, YWCP includes five levels of choral experience for young women ages five through eighteen. Vincent Oakes is in his fifteenth year as Artistic Director of the Chattanooga Boys Choir, a music education and performance organization founded in 1954 which now includes over 120 choristers ages 8-18 in five ensembles. Since 2006, Mr. Oakes has also been the Director of Choral Music at The Baylor School, a grade 6-12 independent day and boarding school in Chattanooga. Under his direction, the choral program has more than tripled in size to include over 240 participants in four student choirs

and a faculty choir. In 2015, he was awarded Baylor's Glenn Ireland Chair for Distinguished Teaching. As a conductor/clinician, he has conducted numerous honor choirs and festivals throughout the United States, including the Alabama ACDA Young Voices Festival, South Dakota ACDA Middle School Honor Choir, Florida ACDA Men's Honor Choir, and the ACDA North Central Region Middle School Honor Choir. Mr. Oakes earned the Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Florida and the Master of Sacred Music degree in Choral Conducting from Emory University. Jessica Nápoles is Associate Professor of Choral Music Education at the University of North Texas.
